BILLY HODGES ... BACK BY POPULAR DEMAND

Award-winning Southern Gospel tenor Billy Hodges will perform live, in concert, at the SeniorLink dinner on July 20. Billy was raised in West Tennessee and is a former firefighter and first responder for Union City, Tennessee. He began singing in the children's choir at his home church but did not begin his professional career until much later. Billy attended the University of Tennessee Martin where he majored in music. In 1995, Billy joined the legendary Florida Boys Quartet in Pensacola, Florida. In 1997, he returned to UTM to continue his music studies. He returned to the gospel music world in 2001 by joining the Dixie Echoes and moving back to Pensacola. In 2005, Billy joined the Kingdom Heirs at Dollywood and performed with them for almost six years. He resigned from the Kingdom Heirs in 2011 and embarked on his solo ministry the next year. Billy has been voted twice as Top 5 Finalist for Favorite New Soloist, had two number-one songs in the SingNews with the Kingdom Heirs, and has been a Top 5 Finalist for Favorite Tenor multiple times. His signature song "Anchor of Hope" was nominated for Song of the Year in 2006. Please join us for a worshipful evening as we welcome back the incomparable Billy Hodges.

We learned that Amish children only attend school to the eighth grade, and basically the Amish world is one of "practicality" and "equality."

Also, before ending our day, we were treated to a 50's/60's rock and roll show entitled "Juke Box Jive" at the Magic and Wonder Theatre. This group of young people knew all the great songs from that wonderful time period and also how to dance to them! This show group had all of us clapping our hands to the beat and stomping our feet.

Our day on Thursday was spent at the birthplace of our country, Philadelphia. Our step-on tour guide emphasized his love for his home city. Touring the city, we saw the great Liberty Bell, visited the original Congressional House that served Congress for the first ten years of our nation's history. We saw Betsy Ross's house and her grave beside it and viewed statues and historical markers of our first fireman, Ben Franklin, and his burial site. We all decided that it would take days of touring to see all the great sites in Philadelphia. One experience that we all took part in, as recommended by our tour guide, was to enjoy a real Philly Cheese Steak sandwich, an original that we were told should not be missed on our visit. The line was long, but the wait was certainly worth it. Delicious!
